Annual Report

1989

On June 10, 1989, 168 members and guests of the Tallmadge High School Alumni Association met at Tallmadge High School for the 110th Annual Meeting.

We began with a social hour at 5:45 P. M. followed by a full course swiss steak dinner catered by Mel's Catering of Kent, Ohio.

The tables were decorated in blue and gold with red silk roses for all. The arrangement committee chaired by LaDema Youngen Gatten (1938) provided the decorations.

President H. A. "Chuck" Steiner (1940) welcomed the Alumni and their guests.

First Vice President Richard "Rick" Nicodemus (1971) gave the invocation.

After dinner and a brief intermission we moved to the Les Bennett Room for our meeting and program.

President Steiner called the meeting to order at 7:30 P. M.

A special thanks was given John and Daisy Ilg Scalia of A-A Blueprint for donating all of our printing services.

President Steiner than introduced all the officers and committees and thanked them for their work.

The Secretary's report of the 109th meeting was read and approved.

The Treasurer's Report was read and approved.

The Treasurer's Books were audited by R. E. Crislip (1948) and were found to be accurate and in order.

Daniel McCombs, Superintendent of Tallmadge Schools, reported on the school system.

Striving to Be the Best . . . Expecting Nothing Less! The motto of Tallmadge High School seems to be well served in the Class of 1989. It is characterized by state and national competitions. Academically, musically and athletically, competitions bring recognition to Tallmadge High School.

This year we have six National Merit Finalists and two Commended students. Five of the six finalists have received corporatesponsored scholarships. Twenty-two percent of the graduating seniors will be receiving financial aid. In addition to the local Tallmadge Scholarship Program totaling \$24,850.00 our students have indicated that over \$213,000.00 has been awarded to graduates of this class over the next four years.

The Mathematics Association of America team placed 81st among 503 participating Ohio schools.

Eighteen credits were required for graduation. Of the 216 seniors, seventy percent completed 22 or more credits. The State Award of Distinction was given to the students earning 4 units of English, three units of Math, 3 units of Social Studies., and 3 units of Foreign Language. This honor was earned by 52 seniors. Forty students received the Presidential Academic Fitness Award indicating a 3.3 or better grade point average. They must have scored at least in the 80th percentile on a standardized test taken in their junior or senior year and have earned at least 12 credits of the "new basics" in the academic core curriculum.

Seventy percent of Tallmadge seniors planned an academic curriculum geared toward college; fifty-six percent of these students completed the Ohio CORE curriculum. Thirty-one percent of our students took a vocational program; thirty-nine percent of these vocational students also completed college preparation. Eleven percent of the students took a general curriculum.

By far, the majority of the senior class this year will stay close to home for college. Of the four-year college-bound students, 93% will stay in the State of Ohio. Eighty-three percent of these students will attend state schools. Forty-two percent will attend the University of Akron and twenty-nine percent will attend Kent State University. One student will attend Kent State University through the NEUOCOM Medical School program.

The most predominant college major identified was Business, followed by Education, Engineering and Pre-Med.

Sixty-nine percent of the students plan to attend a four-year college; 9% plan to attend a two-year college. Six percent of the students will enroll in a trade or technical school. Two percent will enter the military service. Fourteen percent of the students will be entering the labor market right after high school.

The marching Band earned a Superior rating in District VI OMEA Competition. They earned a Superior rating at State Competition OMEA. Devilettes, Flags, and Percussion earned Superior ratings in OMEA State Competition. Field Commanders earned an Excellent rating in State Competition OMEA. They participated in Kent Roosevelt's Band Show, the Little League Parade, Memorial Day Parade, and attended Cedar Point.

The Concert Band performed a Christmas Concert, a Pre-Contest Concert. They earned Superior ratings in OMEA Large Group District VI Competition. They earned an Excellent and a Good rating in District VI OMEA Solo and Ensemble Competition. Band members were selected for All-Star Bands at KSU and Nordonia High School.

Stage Band performances included Christmas Concert, Fine Arts Festival and Hoover Stage Band Festival. Students were awarded Talent Citations at Hoover Music Festival.

Chorus earned an Excellent rating at District VI Large Group Contest. Several individuals competed at District VI Solo and Ensemble competition - all received either an Excellent or Superior rating. Seventeen chorus members were selected to participate in the All-Ohio High School Music Festival at Ohio Wesleyan in Mt. Union, Ohio. The chorus and Choraliers were invited to sing at various programs and local malls throughout the Chirstmas season. In the spring the Chorus went on a field trip to Cedar Point. This year's drama productions included "Bone Chiller" and "Sound of Music."

The Fine Arts Festival awarded over 50 Blue First Place Ribbons and seven Best of Show Plaques. The many fine projects made this year include: model house frames, toothpick weight holding structures, cast gold and silver finger rings, weight benches, tool boxes, air powered engines, hammers, chairs, shelves, benches, tape racks, gun cabinets, drafting table, and the Lean, Mean Jelly Bean Machine.

ATHLETICS: We have been a member of the Metropolitan League since 1951. We offered football, cross-country, basketball, wrestling, track, tennis, baseball and soccer for men. Volleyball, cross-country, basketball, track, softball, tennis and soccer is available for women. Golf is open to both men and women.

Athletic Recognition:

Football recognized one Summit-Stark All-Star Football Game Participant.

Cross-Country named a Metro MVP, two All-Metro, won District AA and were AA State Finalists (11th place).

Golf named a Metro MVP and one to the All-Metro.

Boys' Soccer named two All-Metro and one All-Ohio.

Basketball named one All-Metro.

Boys' Tennis claimed the Metro "Coach-of-the-Year."

Boys'Track name**d** one All-Metro and had one AA District Champ. They had two Regional Qualifiers and one State Qualifier.

Baseball won Metro Champ honors. They were AA Sectional and District Champions and AA Regional Runners-Up. They are ranked 4th in Ohio with a(21-2) season. They named five All-Metro Players, Metro MVP, Metro "Coach-of-the-Year" and one All-Ohio Player.

Volleyball named one All-Metro.

Girls' Soccer named two All-Greater Akron.

Girls' Track named one All-Metro and one AA District Champ. They had two AA Regional Qualifiers, and one Regional Champ and one State Qualifier.

Softball were AA Sectional, District and Regional Champions. They were State Champions for the third consecutive year. - They named four All-Metro players and one All-Northeastern Ohio Player.

Tallmadge High School looks forward to another challenging and rewarding year in 1989-90. We anticipate approximately 706 students in Grades 9-12. The faculty consists of 56 teachers, Three counselors, one librarian, two learning disabilities tutors and two administrators.

Class of 1939

The 50 year Class Report was given by Richard Everhart. Melva Hinton Johnson contributed many hours through the years keeping in touch wih the graduates.

The year was 1927 when 44 of us entered the first grade at Tallmadge. Our teacher was Miss Reichert who later became Mrs. Stamford. Sixty two years later there are 19 of us here today.

In 1928 Miss Winner was our teacher. She was a very attractive woman and later became Mrs. Roach. Unfortunately, the school administration decided we would have individual pictures taken that year, so no class picture was taken.

In 1929, we still numbered 44 in our third grade class and our teacher was Miss Ada Vaught.

In 1930, we were split into two groups of about 30 pupils each. This was the year when Tallmadge Schools were ordered to take in all pupils living in Tallmadge Township which included most of Goodyear Heights and Ellet. The section I was in had for our teacher Miss Gee who later became Mrs. Hardy. The day our class picture was taken, Miss Gee was absent so our substitute teacher, Mrs. Metta Point is shown in our fourth grade class picture.

In 1931 as we entered the fifth grade, we had Mrs. Atwood as our teacher. She later became Mrs. Hine. Although Mrs. Atwood was noted for her severity and sterness, we soon learned a great deal under her capable tutelage.

In 1932 as we entered junior high school, we had as our homeroom teacher, Mrs. Hazel Williams.

In 1933 we had Mrs. Mildred Tripcony as our homeroom teacher. She was a "no nonsense" teacher and very adept at teaching us math.

In the eighth grade, Mr. Howard Barnes was our homeroom teacher. Mr. Barnes was beloved by all and had a most unique way of educating us. He walked slowly around the room telling us stories illustrating various facts of history. The only trouble was, we could remember the stories but not what the history lesson was about.

He frequently would end his stories with, "now you have it, folks." The problem for me was I usually didn't know what I had. Nonetheless, Mr. Barnes was one teacher we would always remember with great fondness, and later, since he was a minister, many returned to be married by him.

As we entered high school in 1935, our freshman class numbered 42. Our homeroom teacher was Miss Faith Barber who later became Mrs. Harold Barlow. Mr. H. H. McCobb was our superintendent and was sometimes affectionately called "Corny"

Our sophomore homeroom teacher was Mr. Donald Cordier who also taught sciences including biology. I remember how hard it was for me and Tom Herman to disect a frog and make any sense out of what we were doing.

Our junior class homeroom teacher was Mr. Walter Showalter who also taught typing and business courses. For our senior year, we had Miss Beatrice Curry who soon became Mrs. Paul Hawkins. Mrs. Hawkins was an excellent math teacher and also was adept in teaching Latin.

Mr. McCobb was still superintendent and in May 1939, 34 of us were graduated from Tallmadge High School. There were 22 girls and 12 boys. Our valedictorian was Virginia Miller Viles. Our president was Ellis (Bill) King. I believe all attended the Alumni Banquet that year as it was considered one of the things we were obligated to do as seniors.

Fred Aber, Jr. started Tallmadge Schools in first grade. Was in U. S. Army 1942-46, employed 40 years at Goodyear. Marrie has one daughter and three grandchildren.

Naomi Beam Poe started Tallmadge in 11th grade. Received BS in education and MA in reading. Married 40 years, has three sons one daughter and seven grandsons. Has won honors in education and historical societies.

Leona Beers Evans started Tallmadge in first grade. Married 46 years, has four sons, one daughter and 11 grandchildren and five great grandchildren. Was employed at Goodyear Aircraft, Sears and Montgomery Wards.

Mary Billich Boggs started Tallmadge in fifth grade. Married 46 years has a son and daughter and two grandchildren. and is a homemaker.

Carol Brickley Kinder started Tallmadge in fourth grade. Married twenty-eight years, has son and daughter and three grandchildren. Was employed at Goodyear Aircraft. Traveled with Ted Mack's Variety Show and drove school bus.

Cora Louise Cunningham Durst started Tallmadge in sophomore year. Married, has three sons, one daughter and four grandchildren.

Richard K. Everhart started Tallmadge in first grade. Went to Ohio University and Kent State University. Married 47 years has three daughters, one son, four grandsons, four grandaughters and one great grandaughter. Instructor of aviation mechanics in aircraft plant. Worked as teacher and social worker most of life.

Robert T. Gallagher started Tallmadge in junior year. Received AB from Kent State and an M.C. from St. Louis University and took special training at Western Reserve University. Married 45 years, has two sons, three daughters and 17 grandchildren. Served as an orthopedic surgeon in the U. S. Army from 1943-47.

Thomas S. Haney started Tallmadge in sophomore year. Received BA from Loyola, New Orleans and George Washington University, and a law degree from University of Akron. Married 43 years. Although he has no children, he and his wife have helped parenting and educating 23 nieces and nephews. He was in the newspaper business twenty-three years before becoming an attorney.

Thomas L. Herman started Tallmadge in first grade. Although Tom attended a military shool for a year, he received his diploma from Tallmadge High School. He has been widowed twice. He has one son, one daughter and five grandchildren. He flew for Army Air Corps, later U. S. Airforce and was a pilot for Firestone 39 years. Melva Hinton Johnson started Tallmadge in first grade. Worked at Goodyear Aircraft during World War II and has been a bookkeeper at Singer Sewing Machine Company and worked in Accounting Dept. of Ohio Edison Company. She has been married two years

Ellis Wilfred King started Tallmadge in first grade. Received BS and MS from Kent State. He was a teacher and a principal in several area schools. Was in the Army 1940-45. He has two daughters and two grandsons. Went into the publishing business where he was president of Lyons & Carnahan. Retired as Editor-in-Chief of Rand McNally Company.

Glenna LeBaron Allsberg started Tallmadge in sophomore year. Married 46 years, has four sons and seven grandchildren.

Louise Lichleitner Cunningham started Tallmadge in eighth grade. Married, but now a widow, has one son, two daughters, nine grandchildren and ten great grandchildren. Has worked as a medical assistant for Akron doctors.

Polly McAllister Stotler started Tallmadge in third grade. Married thirty-six years, has two sons and three grandchildren. Worked as a school secretary.

Virginia Miller Viles started Tallmadge in third grade. Attended Akron University, John Huron Art Institute of Indianapolis, American River College in Sacramento. Married 37 years, has one daughter and two grandchildren. Worked as a secretary and she and her husband ran their own business in Enon, Ohio, she said this town was none spelled backward. She has travelled quite extensively.

Marjorie Katherine Shuman Randall started Tallmadge in junior year and attended Kent State. Was married 35 years, has four sons, four daughters, eleven grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Won an award for meritorious service in U. S. Army. Could not attend because of impending surgery.

Harold D. Shreve started Tallmadge in freshman year. Married forty-six years, has two sons, one daugher and one grandchild. Served in the Navy from 1942-45. Worked at Eastern Airlines thirty years and now sells real estate.

Katherine Flora Steiner Rabb (likes to be called "Mickey") started Tallmadge in fifth grade. Attended Hammel Business College. Marrie 46 years, has two sons and two grandchildren. Worked at Akron General Hospital in records, bookkeeping and on switchboard.

Winifred White Powers started Tallmadge in first grade. Attended Kent State and Akron U. Married 42 years, has two sons and three daughters. Worked as secretary at Akron City Hospital where she is now director of volunteers.

Once again, we pause to memorialize our recently deceased members.

A name was omitted from our Memorial list in the Alumni Report last year.

John Richard Porter died June 9, 1988, age 55 years, graduated in the class of 1951.

The following is our report of deceased Tallmadge High School Alumni members of who we have record since our last meeting.

We have reports of the death of two former Tallmadge teachers.

Thomas O. Morgan died January 19, 1989, age 80 years. Many of you will recall Mr. Morgan joined Tallmadge school teaching staff in 1946 as principal. At that time Herbert H. McCobb was superintendent. Then two years later they traded positions, Mr. Morgan became superintendent and Mr. McCobb became principal. Mr. Morgan was superintendent until 1966.

You probably well remember those years when Mr. Morgan was superintendent. Those were hectic times. Tallmadge was growing by leaps and bounds. So was school attendance.

The basement of the old red brick building was remodeled into class rooms. Clases were held in the cafeterias. First and second graders attended school in shifts, part in the morning - the rest in the afternoon.

Dunbar school was built in 1950 and immediately five more rooms were added.

Overdale school was erected in 1951 and a year later an eight room addition was made to that building.

This highschool building where we are meeting tonight, was occupied in 1960. Munroe shool came in 1961 and David Bacon was under construction.

Those certainly were frustrating years when Tom Morgan was superintendent; when school attendance tripled from 1162 students to 3578. That epoch, under the administration of Mr. Morgan, is an amazing and fascinating chaper in school history.

Mrs. Helen Elizabeth Kennedy Phinney died at Carrollton, Ohio June 21, 1988, age 72 years. Those of you who were in third grade during the years 1935 through 1939 will doubtless remember Mrs. Phinney. She was your teacher, but her name then was Miss Kennedy.

We conclude this memorial with these encouraging words:

But God hath promised strength for the day, Rest for the labor, light for the way, Grace for the trials help from above; unfailing sympathy-Undying love.

One Hundred Years Ago

The first few meetings of our Tallmadge High School Alumni Association were held in the homes of members and the town hall in the center park.

Came an urge to go places - and for two years the meetings were in Akron - at the newly built Windsor Hotel (corner Broadway and Mill Streets) and then at the Buchtel Hotel (corner S. Main and Mill Streets). An evening train took members to Akron and they came home on the midnight train. The year 1889 was the tenth anniversary of both the Class of 1879 and the Alumni Association. That annual meeting was held at Silver Lake Park.

Only the very oldest grads will rememb**er** Silver Lake Park, and that recollection will be with a tingling **glow** of nostalgia.

About 1918 Silver Lake Park was allotted and is now a part of the incorporated Village of Silver Lake.

Silver Lake Park was opened by Ralph H. Lodge in 1876. Soon a spur was built into the Park from the C.A. & C. R. R. (Cleveland, Akron & Columbus, later the Pennsylvania now Conrail). Excursion trains were operated to the Park for a day's picnicking from points as far as Columbus. Silver Lake Park was on its way to become northeast Ohio's most popular resort for over thirty years.

The Park was open only on week days. No liquor was permitted anywhere on its well patrolled grounds.

When our Alumni meeting was first held at Silver Lake Park there was a bath house, where bathing suits could be rented, and a diving tower. A pavillion stood on the lake shore. There row boats could be rented by the our. From an adjoining wharf a steam boat made trips around the lake.

A number of cottages nestled in the woods by the lake were rented by the week to vacationers.

Tree shaded covered picnic tables were available with a well and hand pump nearby.

Sheds were provided in which to put horses. Those horses were admitted free but the entrance fee otherwise was 5¢ per person.

Friday afternoon, July 26, 1889, Alumni members assembled at the old historic Congregational Church in the center park. From there they rode to Silver Lake in two hayrack wagons, each pulled by a team of horses. The ride took about an hour.

Our membership then totaled 78. 41 (53%) of that number were present that day.

Quoting the secretary's minutes:

"The first exercise of the afternoon was partaking of the sumptious repast furnished by the members of the association

The names of the members were called and responded to by some appropriate quotation."

The history of each of the eight classes was read (there were no graduating classes in 1883, 1885 and 1889)

Miss Martha Maltby was present. She was the first T. H. S. principal and the organizer of our Association. Her remarks were heartily applauded.

Plans were made to hold the next annual meeting (1890) at Silver Lake.

Those were the days before Silver Lake had electric lights.

Darkness was rapidly setting in and the meeting was hastily adjourned.
