June 13, 1998 approximately 185 Alumni and guests met at Tallmadge High School for the 119th annual banquet and meeting.

We began with a social hour at 5:45 P.M. followed by a chicken and beef buffet dinner, served by MCW Food Service (formerly Mel's Catering Kent, Ohio.

The decorations were the traditional Blue and Gold. The 50 year class had special decorations at their tables. The arrangement committee was chaired by James Werner (1943).

President Faith Wagner Hause (1943) welcomed the Alumni and guests.

The invocation was given by First Vice President Chris Bauch (1971).

After dinner and a brief intermission we moved to the Les Bennett room for our meeting and program.

President Hause called the meeting to order and introduced the officers and committees and thanked them for their work,

A special thanks was given John and Daisy Ilg Scalia of A-A Blueprint for donating all of our printing services.

The Secretary's Report of the 118th Annual Meeting was read and approved.

The Treasurer's Report was read and approved.

The Treasurer's Books were audited by Wilma Crites Newlon (1933) and found to be accurate and in order.

Superintendent of Schools Robert G. Love gave us an informative report on the schools.

On Sunday June 7th, 1998 191 seniors were graduated from Tallmadge High School.

The school day consists of 4 blocks each semester, 83 minutes in length. Each class meets five days per week with lab experience offered within. The enrichment block offers office hours, activities and extended lab time.

A minimum of 22 credits are required for graduation. Forty five percent of the high school faculty have master's degrees or more.

The high school library houses over 14,000 print and audio visual items. The librarian presents research skills to all grade levels.

We offer learning disabilities support, developmentally handicapped classes and severe behavior disorder handicap programs at Tallmadge High School. Tutoring is available for academic intervention.

Thirty seven graduates shared in the nearly \$32,000 in local scholarships made possible by Tallmadge businesses, services and professional organizations amd memorial foundations and trusts fund the local scholarships.

The Alumni Association funded a \$500.00 Scholarship and the recipient was Jason Buffa who plans to major in geography at Kent State University.

Future plans of the 1998 graduates - 78% will attend a four year college - 5% will attend a two year college - 3% will attend a Trade, Technical College - 2% will enter the military - 12% will enter the labor market.

# Extra Curricular Activities

J.O.G. Jobs for Ohio's Graduates is a school to work transition program for seniors. Seniors meet during enrichment block to cover resume writing interviewing, budgeting and More! Members also have the opportunity to participate in field trips, celebrity guest speakers and a job fair.

Industrial Tech Club took field trips to Henry Ford museum and Greenfield Village, Dayton Air Force Base and Tallmadge Metal and Spinning. Their fourth grade project this year was the Telephone.

Academic Challenge Team had the best record ever - 13-5 and placed 4th in the Summit County League of 13 schools.

The Dramatic Productions for 1997-1998 were "Picnic at Hanging Rock" and Grease. The Drama department was also involved with the community inter-generational production of "Cheaper by the Dozen" and "Music Man".

Our drama program is an excellent and enjoyable way to fulfill the college entrance recommendation for fine arts. It's exciting to be on the cutting edge of high school drama which is the fastest growing program in the United States.

Vocal Music - The 45 member choir participated in a number of events this year. Tallmadge Hi School was host for the second annual Fall Festival of Four, which included choirs from Kent Roosevelt, Stow, Tallmadge and Woodridge High School. They performed at their annual Holiday Concert and Spring all district concert. The choir was rated excellent at the Ohio Music Educator's Association competition held at Copley Fairlawn High School.

The members of the A cappella Choir performed at the Holiday Tree Festival at the J. S. Knight Center, the Homecoming Football game and all other concerts and Commencement.

Jazz Band - the 23 member Jazz Band has been very successful this year. The group performed at all band concerts and has performed during enrichment at the high school. The band competed this year in the Music in the Parks Festival in Toronto, Canada and returned with a first place trophy and best of show trophy.

Marching Band - The marching band had a superior year. They performed at Kent Roosevelt and Cuyahoga Falls band shows. They competed at Norton, Marlington and Claymont competitions. The band was rated superior at Marlington and Claymount and earned a trip to compete at the State Marching Band Finals. The band received an excellent rating at state and also received a first place trophy at the Parks Festival in Toronto, Canada.

The 58 member concert band performed exceptionally well the entire year. They received an excellent rating at the OMEA Districk Band an Choir Competition at Aurora High School, and a third place trophy at the Music in the Parks Festival in Toronto, Canada and performed for the winter concert in March and at Commencement.

CLASS OF 1948 - 50 YEAR CLASS

Fifty years! Has it really been that long?

In September 1936 - 20 shy, backward children approached first grade. We were brought under control by our teachers  $_{M}$ rs. Roach and Miss Blanc - and we all went  $_{t}$  brough twelve years together.

We picke up 19 more in the second through 8th grades and 18 in High School.

So that on graduation day, May 28th, 1948 there were 57 young men and women ready to make our mark on the world! College, Business School, the Service and just life were ahead of us.

Our Class had one distinction, seven of us had twins!

Many have gone far - we spread over the United States, and as age takes over - Florida has it's share.

We have lost eight to death through the years.

Twenty-eight are with us tonight - Mike DeChant came from Florida and was to be here - but is now in City Hospital with mini strokes. We need to send our prayers up for him.

We meet monthly at Murphy's for breakfast, and last Tuesday I asked Alvin Sayre to help me with my talk - and when he read it to me Wednesday - I insisted, as the author, he must read it to you! I give you Alvin Sayre.

As I look around...See all these bright snd smiling faces ... I know the younger of you can't possibly realize the things that are going through the  $\min_{\mathbf{GS}}$  of the kids from MY class..The class of 48 As kids and young adults we were PRIVILEGED to live in a world where NOTHING was as complicated as EVERYTHING is today.

Fift Years....FIFTY..YEARS!!!!.........UNBELIEVSBLE!! ..You can't IMAGINE all the things, WE kids have seen and done!...Our class motto was "Rowing Not Drifting"...And y'know ...I think MOST of us have lived our lives by that motto...We worked HARD because we were raised to believe hard work was GOOD....And we TAUGHT that.. To our kids...

We lived with the Fear, Heartaches an Excitement of World War II in our Pre-teen and early teen years snd started our own families during that little "Conflict" in Korea.... We raised our kids during the "The Cold War'... Watched our sons and daughters suffer thru the "Lost Cause" that was Viet Nam...And again In The Persian Gulf.....Even the Lucky Ones from our Class of 1948 have seen a LOT OF SADNESS ..... But d'you know what? We've had a Good Life!

We entered this old world of ours at just the right time!....We saw a LITTLE of the Great Depression .But at OUR AGE .. Back then.. Who knew.. In terms of what we have today. That we were poor? God allowed US to see "Just Enough" of those hard times.. "Just Enough" of our mothersand fathers struggling SO hard to put food on the table and clothes on our backs "Just Enough" to make us appreciate And everything we have today.... everything we had before anyone We knew had become sophisticated. Before everything became so technical . Before Jeans and Shoes and Shirts had to have labels.... When kids climbed trees.. Rode bikes on dirt roads. played marbles, Red Light/Green Light and Kick the Can... We shot sling shots. Ice skated in the swamps. Roller skated at the rinkjust off the Circle, And Later, hung out at the H & H... We even had fun at SCHOOL!!!....Swinging on the monkey bars and Giant Strides.. On the playground around the Old Red Brick....School Building they "Condemned" when we were in fourth grade . . to get a new one... The one they re still using to THIS DAY !!.. . And remember the Sock Hops?.. The Paper Drives?...Singing on the way to the games?..."Zillion Bottles of Beer on the Wall"?

What were the other songs?.... Oh! ..And remember going Tobogganing? Remember how we had to wrap our legs around the person in front of us?... How we all just pushed back the tiniest bit?....To brace ourselves for the breath taking ride down the hill and half way across rhe big frozen lake at the bottom?... how no one laughed harder than Miss Tsilkoff when we found that her cute little snow covered derriere had been pushed off the end of the sled and had been DRAGGEDall the way down the hill??..our own respected and VERY much loved little teacher...MIGHT have .. On THAT toboggan hill. On that FANTASTIC night. Become the worlds very first .. Anchor Person..

We did ALL those things....Together...THAT was the key word...

OUR Teachers in addition to TEACHING us were a FUN part of our
lives...They were truly our friends WE were ALL friends...Before
drugs and AIDS.... We DID have guns... But back THEN we used them
for hunting rabbits!...And we fell in love.. The GUYS with CARS..

The girls with guys...But then...Later... Just as it was meant to be
Guys and girls fell in love with each other... This one that one..

Overand over again....Like musical chairs ... We fussed and
fretted over Puppy Love ....Muddled our way through the mine fields
of experimentation and wide eyed enlightenment.. Til by Trial and
Error Dumb Luck and the guiding hand of God ... Some of us were
lucky enough to find true love and a lasting happiness

Most of us are retired now..or at least we"re hoping that the hardest part is over. But there"s a big job that is still FAR from over. And due to both ignorance and a lack of concern it s getting more serious everyday...We need to stay aware of what is happening in our world Class of 1943... if we try we can see and understand things even more clearly now that we have time to drift...And you other people might take heed...

God is continuing to endow each of his children and every living thing with the basic instincts he knew we would need to survive and populate the earth with our own kind, But he leaves it to peoplelike you and me, to teach our kids how to use and control these instincts in accordance with the rules of our current, individual societies,, And now wer're talking serious Stuff,,, We're talking about the instincts that make us want to manipulate and dominate and even KILL our fellow man, As well as the instincts to mate and procreate,, The instincts we'd like to sometimes blame on the devil,,, And we're talking about teaching kids to recognize and learn to control these instincts as soon as they begin to NATURALLY appear, While they are still babies, As young as three or four years old,, Rather than let them grow unnoticed and unattended, in an environment that has spawned the ME Generation Instant Gratification, School Yard Shootings and a veritable avalanche of Teenage Pregancies

You and I are old enough now, to have learned that we can, t teach kids by preaching "Thou Shalt Not", , We are old anough to know kids can best be lead by Example, Good Faith, and Loads and Loads of Love,,,

Each of us has been given "Day to Day" Survival Instincts that, if not controlled, can drive each of us to Lie and Cheat and Steal Instincts that cause us to fight and claw our way to the top of the heap or toward any goal we perceive as worth having Instincts that drive us to Dominate and Manipulate Instincts that drive us to rule the world or greedily snatch a cheap item from another person's hand at a busy bargain table These instincts can erupt Even in the sweetest little old ladies As '"Road Rage" There's NOTHING quite as disconcerting as seeing someone's Grandmother Driving fifteen miles an hour in heavy traffic Straining to see over the dashboard Suddenly raise a boney little finger to bestow a "number one" rating on an impatient fellow motorist God gives us the strength and the will to survive

Our instincts pre-date and aretotally incompatible with the rules of every civilized society — And yet they have caused the inevitable downfall of every nation in our history — These "Gifts from God" don't ONLY Include the Urge to Dominate and Manipulate — They also include and underlying Urge to Kill

And God gave us "Long-Term" survival instincts To insure survival of the Species rather than Self,,, For this he gave us Sex,,,

We seem to accept domination, manipulation and killing, The worst examples shock us, for a moment, Make us ruefully shake our heads But we can read about and talk to each other about even the most terrible of these kinds of atrocities, As kidswe learned to laugh about them,, in cartoons, and we tend to shrug them off in real life, if we are not directly involved,

But even though sex is God Given., And surely more desirable than killing., We don't talk about it. We CAN'T talk about it without embarrassing some one., We make a great mystery out of all things sexual. With sex, it's always been a see-saw battle but the most self-righteous normally prevail...They've led Society by the nose and built a facade of fantasy around EVERYTHING sexual, rather than simply accepting sex graciously as a legitimate gift from God and dealing with it openly and orderly as befits a TRULY ciciliaed society...A society where the socially polite term of "Abortion" would never be used to describe and legitimize the Mass-Murder of our own progeny as a"Normal" and Legal means of Birth Control... God willing ..Our jobs like our productive lives, are far from over...Indeed.. They are simply beginning...So let's vow to make the most of them....Let's vow to be better role models and give more of our attention to our kids....
