June 12, 1999, 172 Alumni and guests met at Tallmadge High School for the 120th Annual Banquet and Meeting.

We began with a social hour at 5:45 P. M. followed by a chicken AND RIGATONI BUFFET DINNER CATERED BY DiFeo Catering.

The decorations were the traditional Blue and Gold. The arrangement committee was chaired by James Werner (1943)

President Chris Bauch ((1971) welcomed the Alumni and guests.

The invocation was given by First Vice President Pat Bumpas M Chovich 1958

After dinner and a brief intermission we moved to the Les Bennet room for our meeting and program.

President Bauch called the meeting to order and introduced the officers and committees and thanked them for their work.

A special thanks was given John and Daisy Scalia of A-A Blueprint for donating all our printing services.

The Secretary's Report of the 119th Annual Meeting was read and approved.

The Treasurer's Report was read and approved.

The Treasurer's Books were audited by Wilma Crites Newlon (1933) and found to be in order.

Superintendent of Schools Robert G. Love gave us an informative report on the schools.

On Sunday June 6, 1999, 185 Seniors were graduated from Tallmadge High School.

Future plans of the graduates, 71% will attend a 4 year college; 4% will attend a two year college; 8 % will attend a trade or technical college; 5% will enter the military and 12% will enter the labor market.

Forty-six graduates shared in more than \$38,000.00 in scholarships from local business and service and professional organizations.

The Alumni Scholarship for \$500.00 was awarded to Marianna Freed who will attend Kent State.

Extra Curricular Activities:

J.O.G. Jobs for Ohio Graduates is a school to work transition program for seniors. Seniors meet during enrichment block to cover resume writing, interviewing budgeting and more. Members also have the opportunity to participate in field trips, celebrity guest speakers and a job fair.

Industrial Technology Club: The Industrial Tech Club took field trips to Lordstown and Wendall August Forge. Their fourth grade project was the Xylophone.

National Forensics Team: The forensics Team qualified for state competition in a 4 man Policy Debate, Original Oratory, Dramatic Interpretation. Duo Acting and Duet Acting. Autumn Sanders was an alternate for nationals. Stephen Webb finished in the quarter finals in Dramatic Interpretation. Joe Perkins & Eric Urycki made the semifinals in Duet Acting. Debate finished in the top 8.

Drama Productions: The productions of 1998-1999 were "Varey The Vampire" and "Guys & Dolls". The drama department was also involved with the community intergenerational production of "Dr. Doolittle" and "Oliver"

Our drama program is an excellent and enjoyable way to fulfill the college entrance recommendation for fine arts.

Vocal Music: The 48 member choir participated in a number of events this year. They participated in the third annual Fall Festival of Four which includes choirs from Kent Roosevelt, Stow, Tallmadge and Woodridge High Schools.. They performed at their annual Holiday Concert and Spring All-District Concert. The choir was rated excellent at the Ohio Music Educators Association District Competition held at Copley-Fairlawn High School.

The members of the A cappella Choir performed at the Holiday Tree Festival at the J. S. Knight Center in Akron, the Homecoming Football game and all the other concerts and Commencement.

Jazz Band: Jazz Band has been very succesful this year. The group performed at all band concerts and has performed during enrichment at the high school.. The band competed this year in the Music in the Parks Festival in Toronto, Canada and returned with a first place trophy and best of show trophy.

Marching Band: The marching band had a superior season thie year. They performed at the Cuyahoga Falls band show. They competed this year at Marlinton, Claymont and Cloverleaf competitions. They received a superior rating at Marlinton and Claymont and earned a trip to compete at the State Marching Band Finals and received an excellent rating at state.

Concert Band: The 60 member concert band performed exceptionally well the enti re year. They received an excellent rating at the OMEA District Nand and Choir Competition atAuroraHigh School. They performed for the winter concert in March with the Tallmadge Middle School Bands and at Commencement.

FIFTY YEAR CLASS WE ARE THE ' 49ers - Dorothy V. Sanderson Bray

We are the '49ers. Fifty years ago, as we graduated, 1999 seemed so very far away! Where did all that time go?? Well, looking back over the past years, we haven't done too badly for ourselves.

We had 50 in our graduating class and sadly through the years we have lost ten to Death. Just last week Gloria Conley died in Michigan. We miss them all. Our Class colors were Blue and White; our flower the Pink Carnation and most importantly - our class motto "Not Finished Just Begin."

We have Firemen, Police Officers, Machinists, Medical and Industrial Technicians, Long Distance Truck Drivers, a Research Technician for th National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Authors, Teachers and best of all MOTHERS AND FATHERS who managed to keep the family together!

School Days, School Days, good old golden rule days - We started in September 1937 with 25 classmates who continued together to graduation in 1949, with 28 more classmates joining us through the years.

Miss Blank's 1st Grade room had a little house built into one corner. Mrs. Roach's room held a sand box for our creative expressions; of course, we had the usual birthday parties, end of the year picnics, trips away from school; Home Room Mothers (now these were important) Measles, Mumps and Chicken Pox. Through our elementary years, our teachers molded us into a working and learning unit-though each of us were different - we became a family - who really liked each other.

School Days, School Days - In Junior High we began to change classes and had more than one teacher to guide us. We were so grown up!! In gym class - the girls had those horrible blue gym suits that looked like bloomers. When the girls had volleyball tournaments in the gym at noon - you could bet all the boys were in the balcony - to look and giggle. Noon movies and dances also kept us busy and out of trouble.

School Days School Days - As we moved on into Senior High, our class plays became a Big Deal. Mr. Bill Plant was our Drama Teacher and he inspired us to do bigger and more professional productions. In one such play, Mr. Plant devised a plan to place four groups of singers in the four corners of the balcony of the auditorium. At a given signal the spot light would hit one group who would sing, then the light would go to the next group-until all four corners had performed around the auditorium. Then all four groups of singers sang in unison to finish the song. Thanks to our own Bill Plant, we performed the "First Stereo Surround Sound" in History.

School Days School Days - Good Old Golden Rule Days, reading and writing and arithmetic - taught to the tune of a hickory stick But wait - oh no our teachers cannot discipline in this fashion anymore. When we were sent to the office to see Mr. McCobb and his paddle - that was the ultimate and final step -you were in REAL TROUBLE!! You were scared - You were humiliated - Yes, and 99% of the offenders never crossed that threshold again. Now - the teachers give "Time Out", Yellow slips sent home to Mom and horror, maybe a detention.

Could this be the reason so many of our schools have been torn apart by violence? Children killing children. Children killing teachers.

The 49' ers Class Motto is "Not Finished-Just Begun." Maybe we need to keep being active in our schools - through the local school boards, and in our local and state government - and yes even in our Federal Government to re-install the old values of respect, caring and love toward each other. Will this help? Who knows but it sure can't hurt!! The 49'ers thank you.

At this time the Association presented 50 year pins and tie tacs to the men and women of the class. They were also given a golden delicious apple for good health which were furnished by June King Marsh (1934).

School day memories. Sometimes you can go for years and even decades without thinking about your school days. Other times, from out of nowhere, you're reminded of an event or a classmate. You spend a few seconds recalling, and then you move back to the here and now: work, kids, hurrying from place to place. But, every now and then, the floodgates open and the memories come rushing back. For me, two things have opened those memory floodgates recently, one in daily trickles of memories and one with the rush of a flash flood.

Since September of last year, I have heard daily from my son about his life as a first grader. Just walking into an elementary school brings back memories, of course. On the first day of school in September last year, standing with other parents and all of the children of the school at a flag-raising ceremony, I watched the faces of a sea of first graders. Some had gap-toothed grins. Others looked so serious and scared. As I heard the snap of the flag as it reached the top of the flagpole and heard the children say the Pledge of Allegiance, in my memory I'm standing with my first grade class on the front lawn of Munroe Elementary in 1962 watching the Color Guard raise the flag. I remember standing each morning to say the Pledge of Allegiance in our class room. I remember how big and unknown Munroe Elementary seemed to me when I first started there.

Back in the present, I wave goodbye to my own little first grader, hoping he won't feel overwhelmed in his big school. (I learned that evening that I shouldn't have worried. From the perspective of a first grade boy, the school building is just a building that shades part of the playground!)

A few weeks after school started, at Curriculum Night at my son's school, sitting at my son's little miniature first grader desk, I opened the lid of the desk to peek inside. For a moment, I'm transported back to my own first grade desk in Mrs. Starkey's room at Munroe Elementary. My desk is in the back left of the room. Next to me is a boy who is so disgusting! He's eating the paste from his paste jar! In the front of the room is the first of a long line of teachers who would give me a love of learning. Mrs. Starkey, who was so beloved that I cut her picture out from the yearbook and put it in the little gold locket I wore. Out the windows down the right side of the room, I can see the playground. (Ah, the playground! Maybe first grade boys and first grade girls aren't so different after all.) Back in the present, my son's teacher talks about reading groups and field trips and my mind is still drifting back to my own school days. The Bookmobile pulled up in front of the school. Taking a field trip to the Akron Zoo. Then my son's teacher talks about the computers in the classroom and I'm definitely back in the 90's.

But, through this year, as my son has told me about school, I've skipped back to 1962 or 1963 many, many times. When he told me about how beautiful the voices of the 4th and 5th graders were at the Spring Concert, I'm back on the front lawn of Munroe Elementary listening—in rapture—while the 5th and 6th graders sing *Swing Low, Sweet Chariot*.

And, finally, when he told me—almost joyfully—one day, that The Girls Were Chasing Him All Over The Playground, I was flung back to that playground at Munroe Elementary and the memory floodgates were opened wide! I could see all of my childhood classmates playing as hard as they could. Swinging on the swings, climbing on the

monkey bars, playing hop scotch and jump rope and four square and tag. And I'm running and running and running from the boys! (Well, at least in my memory the boys were chasing the girls, not the other way around! Maybe, that's a sign of the times, too!) And I'm standing on the first rung of the ladder of the sliding board and the boys catch up and (I'm ashamed to admit this!) I kick out at them and I hear them taunting me "Billygoat! Billygoat!"

If you can believe it, little Timmy Donahue, (who was one of those boys who were chasing me) all grown up now, of course, and visiting my company's headquarters as a consultant last year, told my co-workers that they called me Billygoat in first grade! I guess from some of the memories, you can run but you can't hide! And, so for you, Timmy, I want to tell one more first grade memory: I've always known that this necklace you put in my Valentine in first grade was purloined from the jewelry box of your older sister! You thought I didn't know, but I knew!

The memory floodgates also opened wide these past few days as I searched through boxes in the attic for my yearbook and the program from graduation. As I read through the names of my classmates, the graduating seniors of the Class of '74. As I looked at the memorabilia: Pictures and souvenirs from a memorable trip to Washington, DC with the Close Up program my senior year. I'll never forget my first trip on a jet airplane, taken to let those of us involved in the production of the *Sound of Music* catch up with our classmates who had taken the bus to Washington for the Close Up program. I'll never forget the look on Keith Crane's face as he picked us up in Washington National Airport and saw that Debbie Boyce had traveled on the plane in her Mother Abbess costume from the play! Nor will I forget the poor businessman who had to sit next to Debbie and I in the airplane listening to us pretending to be a real nun and her high school student traveling on a school trip. I have never seen anyone get off of an airplane faster than that man!

I found my class ring, a bracelet with a charm that says Senior 74, Student Council pins, safety patrol pins, Girl Scout pins, 4-H pins. I found a necklace with a lyre on it and the First Division Band book from which I learned to play the French horn. I found necklaces and charms and pictures and, of course, batons from my life as a majorette. And suddenly, up there in the attic I was transported to a Friday night in the Fall of my years in this school. And as I and the other majorettes lead the marching band from behind the school, across the parking lot, I see the Harvest Moon rising over the stadium. Huge, yellow, full. And I hear the tap-tap-tap of the drums guiding our steps to the stadium. And the click-click-click of the cleats of the football players who are silently making their way to the field. And, as I remember the way it felt to enter that stadium as the band suddenly blared out the then-traditional entry song, *The Horse*, I realize that these memories of our school days are just a part of who we are, and where we came from, and where we're going.

On behalf of the 263 members of the Class of '74, the 25 year class that you recognize tonight, I thank you all. Those of you who are our parents and all of you who went before us in these schools. We thank you for the great community and schools that provided us a first-rate education and for the opportunities in life that these schools provided. And, most of all, we thank you for the memories of the times in these schools that made us the men and women that we are today.
