With us tonight is our new Superintendent Jeff Ferguson. Superintendent Ferguson wishes Dr. Frammartino the best on his retirement. Mr. Ferguson has been with the school three years as the principal at the high school and now as the Superintendent. He thanks us for our faith and support. He can't image a better place to work. This year 220 students graduated. From this group we had 55 Heritage families. There were several 4th and 5th generation graduates. The groundbreaking ceremony was in April for the new high school and hopefully in two years we will be sitting in the 650 seat auditorium having our business meeting. This would not have been possible without the support of the people in the community. Mr. Ferguson is honored to hold the position of Superintendent of Tallmadge City Schools. Thank you and welcome.

Tallmadge High School Profile - Graduating Class of 2006:

Tallmadge is a four-year comprehensive high school. There were 934 students in grades 9-12, and 2,686 students in the district. The first class numbering eight was graduated in 1879.

The school day consists of 4 blocks each semester, 83 minutes in length. Each class meets five days per week with laboratory experience offered within. The enrichment block offers teacher office-hours and activities.

Our grading policy is based on a 4.33 unweighted scale for seniors. The only grades not included are those taken pass/fail. Beginning with the year 2000 a minimum of 26 credits are required for graduation. Our minimum requirements include: 4 English, 4 Social Studies, 3 Math, 3 Science, HPE and a specified elective.

The recommended college preparatory curriculum includes: 4 English, 3 Math (through Alg. 2), 3 Social Studies, 3 Science, 2 Foreign Languages, 1 Visual or Performing Art.

The high school library/media center houses over 14,000 print and audio-visual items, an automated card catalog and 24 computers with various programs and on-line search capabilities. The librarian presents research skills to various classes.

We offer specific learning disabilities support, developmentally/multi-handicapped classes and emotionally disabled programs at Tallmadge High School. Tutoring is available for academic intervention.

Extra-Curricular Activities

Marching Band- The 72 members of the 2005 Tallmadge Blue Devil Marching Band performed a competition show titled "That's Entertainment" including the music titles *Phantom of the Opera, Trashing the Camp* from Tarzan, *Dr. Mario and Super Mario Brothers*

Themes. The band performed at all home football games, the Kent Roosevelt Premier of Bands, TMS Indoor Marching Show, Veteran's Day Ceremony and Marching Band Awards Concert. This season's competitions were held in Hilliard, Crestwood and Meawdbrook High Schools. The band qualified for the OME State Marching Band Finals and earned the highest rating of *Superior* at state competition. The band also received a *Silver Rating* at the Heritage Festival in Atlanta Georgia. Congratulations, Band!

Concert Band: The 43 members of concert band performed at Tallmadge High School's March Concert with the TMS 8th Grade Band and May Pops concert the THS Choir and Show Choir. The band provided music at the Tallmadge Little League Parade, Memorial Day Parade and the Tallmadge High School Graduation. The concert band earned a *Silver Award* at the Heritage Music Festival in Atlanta, Georgia. The John Philip Sousa Outstanding Band Member Award winner was *Matt Schoenbaechler* and the US Marine Corps Semper Fidelis Award winner was *Andrew McAlarney*.

Jazz Band: The 2005-2006 THS Jazz Band consisted of 21 members this year. The band performed at numerous concerts and events throughout the year including American Cancer Society Relay for Life. The jazz band earned a *Silver Award* at the Heritage Festival in Atlanta, Georgia. The Louis Armstrong Outstanding Jazz Performer Award winner was *Sam Crouse* and the Woody Herman Jazz Award winner was *Matt Dyer*.

Vocal Music – The choir attended the *Festival of Five* with area schools. The choir participated in the Music in the Parks Choir Competition this past May earning two first place trophies. They also put on three outstanding concerts at the high school: the Holiday Concert and the memorable Spring Concert, which highlighted the graduating seniors.

"Vocal Motion," the show choir, performed for various organizations during the school year as well as all of the concerts. This year's show was called "Hit the Road."

Drama Production – The productions of 2005-2006 were "Music Man" and "Get Witch Quick." The drama department is also involved with other community programs. This is an excellent way to fulfill the college entrance recommendation for fine arts. It's exciting to be on the cutting edge of high school drama. We explore acting, directing, and other aspects of theatre.

Amy then introduced Don Dewey, who represented the 50 year class of 1956.

Good evening, my name is Don Dewey. It's a privilege to be with you and an honor to represent the 50th Reunion Class of 1956 at the 127th annual meeting of the Tallmadge High School Alumni Association.

Before talking about our class, however, I ask for your indulgence for a personal note. I am the eight of ten children. Five graduated from Akron North HS before we moved to Tallmadge in 1946. That year I enrolled in the 3rd grade at the old elementary school on North Avenue. In 1965, my parents retired and sold our home on East Avenue to the Reisig family who, as most of us know, did a wonderful job of restoring the old Victorian farmhouse at the top of the hill. In between those years, like so many others, the younger five of us grew up, graduated from Tallmadge High School and went off into the world.

Four years ago, my sister, Jacqueline Dewey Pounds, celebrated the 50th reunion of the Class of 1952 with some of you. Three years ago, my sister Josephine Dewey Stewart celebrated her 50th reunion, and I believe that my brother, Fred, is planning to be here next year for his 50th. My youngest sibling, Roger, just celebrated his 40th reunion last year, so it will be a few years before his is back. Even though we are scattered from New Hampshire to Colorado, our family has not forgotten its Tallmadge roots.

As I prepared for this talk and struggled a little with what to say, one question kept coming back to me, "What does it mean to be from Tallmadge?" If we had the time, it would be interesting to hear how each of you would answer that question. I suspect that your answer might be influenced by your family upbringing and perhaps your economic status. Surely your age and whether you sill live in Tallmadge would make a difference.

You might mention the unique geography of the city. I've traveled to many parts of this country and nothing compares to Tallmadge Circle with its beautiful four-acre interior park and eight spokes radiating outward. It's a grand town center. I note that the design of the new high school reflects this famed circle.

Your answer might focus on the character of the city, which has no doubt evolved since our class's era. My guess, however, is the city's character is still defined by a small town closeness and community spirit in spite of its having almost tripled in population. Having said that, I'll guess that the community spirit no longer allows you to raise chickens within the city as my family once did.

So, "What does it mean to be from Tallmadge?" The answer for me is found in the Tallmadge schools and the 83 members of the Class of 1956. Ably led by our one-of-a-kind Principal, Mr. Oliver Ocasek, we were taught by a group of individuals who every day demonstrated dedication, hard work, quality and respect. I do not wish to slight anyone, but two teachers stand in my mind, Lee Brubaker, who taught English and Speech, and Richard Lockhart, who taught Algebra, General Math, Physics and Chemistry. What a course load! At a small country school, these men were giants.

Of course, our other teachers and coaches were just as dedicated. Who could ever forget a Driver's Ed teacher named Carr. And, Doris Cercolani's Typing Class, where I received (and deserved) a "C," but learned an incredibly useful skill. Don Owen taught instrumental music and was one of the great band directors in the area, perhaps in the state. And, the man for whom the high stadium is named, Tom Rossiaky, who remained a good friend until his passing last year. I could go on and on. Having attended a large competitive university, I can tell you that I was as well prepared for the rigors of collage as the graduates of any top suburban high school or exclusive prep school.

As I mentioned, we were 83 in the Class of 1956. The 50's were a heady time! We grew up to the early stirrings of the rock and roll nation, and those initial vibrations soon became a crescendo.

It was our eighth grade year, I think, that an insidious device was invented somewhere in the bowels of New York City, which probably changed our lives as much as anything else you can imagine. "What was that?" you say. Well... being with you tonight....PRICELESS. For everything else, there's a credit card.

How many of your remember the Dick Tracy comic strip? Well, who would have predicted that the two-way wrist radio would become a reality? We could spend hors talking about many other changes in our lives, but let's defer that to another dinner,

Sadly, with the passage of time we have lost some friends. Please take a moment to reflect while I read their names: Ralph Jones, Janice Kyser Denton, Shelva Blades Haymaker, Joseph Maselli, Blaine McMann, Joseph Zetts, Ronald Colbert, Karl Luttich, Lanny Dayton, Earnest Beresh, James Frank, Claudine DeWitt Hoisington, Janet Swartz Farkas, Jeanette Pursley Fritter and Dallas Petty, If we had the time, I could probably tell you a story about each of them. They were serious, thoughtful, funny and bright individuals who each contributed in his or her own unique way to the character of our class.

There is one other individual whom we lost and whom I mention last because our class made it a point to honor him this weekend, and I believe that his name was recently added to the memorial in Tallmadge Circle. His is First Lieutenant Wesley Woodford, who was killed in Viet Nam on February 22, 1968, during the so-called Tet Offensive. He was posthumously awarded a Purple Heart and the Bronze Star. Wes was a graduate of Akron University and the Akron University College of Law. Let me simply say that he was a special person.

In closing, I would like to read the dedication in our yearbook written fifty years ago by a very wise man, our Superintendent, Mr. Thomas O. Morgan. It is far more eloquent than anything I could say. Taking some poetic license with the first sentence it reads as follows;

"Seniors:

The year is 2006...fifty years hence. You have opened your Circle Light of 1956 as you have many times and are glancing through its pages. It reminds you that your high school days were happy days... probably the most enjoyable of your life. You look at the faces of your high school classmates and friends. Many of those classmates are still close friends, others you have not seen for several years.

You are reminded of the many worthwhile activities...athletics, dramatics, "Y" Teens, Future Teachers, National Honor Society...in which you were given the opportunity to participate. You see the faces of your teachers and you are considerably more appreciative of the help and guidance they gave you than you were while in school.

You conclude that the pages of the 1956 yearbook speak well for the class and annual staff of 1956, for within it they have left you with many fond memories of your high school career...memories that will ever be cherished. Yes, you will say, my class was a good class, one of which Tallmadge High School can be justly proud.

So, I think that's what it means to be from Tallmadge. Thank you. Now, on behalf of the Class of 1956, I would like to present this check for \$200.00 to the THS Alumni Association for inclusion in the scholarship fund. Thanks again.

At this time we then presented the 50 year class with pins for the women and tie tacs for the men. They were each given a golden delicious apple for good health donated my June King Marsh (1934)

We then recognized the Golden Agers and they also received a golden delicious apple, compliments of June King March.

There was no 25 year report as we could find no one who would commit to representing the class of 1981 on this night.

Chris Bauch then welcomed the class of 2006. Representing the class of 2006 was Chris Labosky who received the Chrysler Award, Phi Beta Kappa, Woodford Athletic, was one of 17 valedictorians, 4-year letter winner in track and cross country. Chris's response was as follows:

First of all, let me say, very sincerely, how honored I am to have been given the opportunity to speak here, if only briefly, on behalf of my class, at the meeting of this prestigious organization — I've been told, one of the oldest Alumni Associations in the country. And let me say, on behalf of the entire class of 2006, how honored **we are** to now be members of this association.

This past year – the last four years really – have been...busy. 220 of us graduated this year, 17 as valedictorians – a distinction reserved for those who maintained a GPA of 4.0 or above throughout their four years of high school – a remarkable number given that all but one of those were also enrolled in at least one Advanced Placement course during their high school careers...a curriculum which I can confirm is at least rigorous and demanding, if not, in some cases, exhausting.

Aside from these 17, our class, of 220, was awarded 70 honors diplomas and 55 students received the presidential award. 80% will attend a four year college, many attending local institutions like Kent State and the University of Akron,, but also schools as diverse and prestigious as The Ohio State University in Columbus, Carneige Mellon University in Pittsburg, LeHigh University, Miami of Ohio, Case Western, Yale, NYU, the Rose-Hulman Institute, and the United States Naval Academy.

I am certainly proud to be a member of such an extraordinary group of **students**, but it would be a grave mistake to forget the accomplishments of the many outstanding **athletes** of our class. I'll mention a few of the highlights from this year alone, though for the past four years Tallmadge has certainly maintained it's tradition of athletic excellence.

The remarkable season of our football team will **not**, of course, be soon forgotten. For the first time in school history Tallmadge became the undefeated champion of the Suburban League, and

for the second year in a row advanced to state final four. **Seven** of our football players were awarded the distinction of First-Team All-Suburban and 2, the distinction of All-Ohio.

Also deserving mention are this year's Girls tennis team, finishing fourth in the league with a record of 12-7, the boys cross country team, league runners-up with three athletes awarded First-Team All-Suburban honors and one the honor of All-Ohio, and also our girls track and field team, winning the district championship for the first time in school history and advancing one individual to the State Meet where she, a freshman, earned All-Ohio honors in two events this year.

Now our class, I think, mush have had way too much time on its hands, since, besides the late night academic lucubration required to graduate 17 valedictorians, and the tremendous effort displayed by so many in almost every athletic arena, we also managed to devote a significant amount of time in service to the community of Tallmadge, Again I'll mention just a representative handful of our 2005 and 2006 projects.

There were the projects of the National Honors Society, a group of what must have been extraordinarily idle students. After all, who else would have had time to help organize Lions Club spaghetti dinners every other month, or supervise the shipment of gift boxes to the less fortunate overseas during Christmas? Or babysit for Overdale and Dunbar parents, or participate in the Ohio Reads program to Dunbar or even assist this past year as math tutors for Munroe students? Hardly an idle bunch, of course, especially considering it consisted of 16 of our 2006 valedictorians and, as always, required a minimum 3.8 GPA for admittance.

But there were also the Red Cross Community dinners for the homeless organized by Leaders in Action, and most recently, the Relay of Life, which won the silver team award given to those groups that raise between 2500 and 5000 dollars.

Among so many projects, our student senate organized a fund raiser for Hurricane Katrina relief in 2005, and administered the canned food drive at Thanksgiving.

One could of course easily multiply these hours of community service by a hundred if we count the required hours served by each graduate for his Government class or the activities of so many other student organizations like STAMP or FCCLA – run by students who each year willing give their own time to the service of others and of the community.

I'm certainly honored to be part of such a remarkable class, and I'm happy to formally accept our admittance into the historic Tallmadge Alumni Association.
