133rd ALUMNI DINNER JUNE 2, 2012

On June 2, 2012, 140 Alumni and guests met for the 133rd Annual Alumni Dinner Meeting. The meeting began with a Social Hour in the gymnasium of Tallmadge Middle School at 5:30 PM with live music by the band, Coach. At 6:30 PM, the dinner, catered by Yummy's Bakery, was served. The menu included Tossed Mixed Green Salad, Asparagus Wrapped in Bacon, Steamed Mixed Vegetables, Chicken Marsala Spirals, Penne Pasta with Meatballs, Pork Loin with Bourbon Apple Glaze, Fresh Baked Rolls with Butter and Mini Cheesecakes, Cupcakes & Cookies.



The decorations were the traditional Blue and Gold. New this year were sign holders and laminated Class signs for classes to indicate where they were sitting.

A welcome was given by President Mary Rzewnicki Cushing (1974) which included the introduction of Superintendent Jeff Ferguson, the 2012 officers (1st Vice President, Bill Hilbish (1974); 2nd Vice President, Patty McNeal Hartshorn (1983); Secretary, Beth Wood (1982), Assistant Secretary, Gayle Bross McMillan (1974); Treasurer, Mary Black Overholt (1963) and Assistant Treasurer, Margie Saylor Metcalf (1959) and members of the band, Coach, which included three Tallmadge Alumni: Dave Highsmith (1976), Jeff Bull (1976) and Gill Landwehr (1977). The invocation was given by Bill Hilbish.

After dinner, those gathered moved to the Les Bennett Center for the Annual Meeting.

Recognition of 50-Year Class:

Mary Cushing then introduced Sandy Hill Dietz to give the report of the 50-year class, the Class of 1962.

Class of 1962 Report:

Good evening and thank you for participating in the Tallmadge High School Alumni Association 133rd annual dinner meeting. My name is Sandi Hill Dietz and I am here representing our THS class of 1962.



We have been really busy planning our 50th reunion to be held in July. We graduated with 114 students. Many from our class still reside in Tallmadge. Sadly, 19 members of our class have passed away.

In 1950, we headed off to first grade, divided to both Central and Dunbar Elementary Schools. When we finally became 5th graders, we were all brought together again, attending the old Central building. In sixth grade, we were divided once again in two grade schools, and had to wait until Junior High at the old building on North Avenue to get back together once again as one class. We had to walk between the buildings to our classes and really remember how that wind could blow between those buildings, especially during the winter months. We had to hold down our skirts!

Our Freshman and Sophomore years were again at the North Avenue location at the old High School. We thought that building was so dilapidated, but we still enjoyed our school days, our sports and our friends. Finally in our Junior year, we attended our brand new building on East Ave. Wow! We were infatuated with our new school! We each had our own locker! Everything was brand new!

Finally we were Seniors, the year we were all so looking forward towards. Top Dogs! We joined Y-Teens, Art Club, French Club, FTA, FHA, Science Club and so many other clubs, hoping to prepare ourselves for our futures. We played football, basketball and ran track and danced at Tayo. Most of all, we were excited about our graduation. Finally our big day came in June, 1962...GRADUATION! Then all too suddenly, we were officially Graduates of Tallmadge High School. Somehow we each managed to move on with our lives, joining the service, attending colleges and getting jobs, some even got married.

So what was happening in 1962 when we had to face the big bad world? Well...

A good income was about \$5,500.00 per year.
Average new car costs "3,000.00
A movie ticket was only \$1.00
Gasoline was 28 cents a gallon
Stamps cost 4 cents each

Books were only on paper, not electronic devices.
Lawrence of Arabia was the hot movie to see. It won the Oscar that year.
Wilt 'the Stilt' Chamberlain scored 100 points in one NBA game.
Mandatory prayer in public schools was ruled unconstitutional.
Viet Nam war continued.
The first heart transplant occurred.
'I Can't Stop Loving You' by Ray Charles was the number one hit.
We listened and danced to music by Bob Dylan, the Beatles and the Rolling Stones.
'Swinging 60s' took over, with recreational drugs and casual sex.
Spider Man made his first appearance in comic books.
John Glenn was the first American to orbit the earth.
K-Mart and Wal-Mart officially opened their first stores.
John Kennedy was elected President with Lyndon Johnson as his Vice President.
Marilyn Monroe overdosed on sleeping pills.
And finally, life expectancy was only 69.7 years.

Response by Class of 2012:

With the absence of the class president you folks will be stuck with me this evening. As Bill said I am Michael Gates, but enough about me let's talk about THS and the class of 2012.

I will start on everybody's favorite topic, athletics. We added a new team to the Suburban League this year, Nordononia, and we lost another, Barberton. Nordononia athletics brought fresh competition and they competed very well.

As we look at our fall sports the Blue Devils faired pretty well. Football started 0-2 and it seemed like we were going for a bum season. Our devil's turned it around and finished the regular season 8-2 and were Suburban League champs. Our cross country team made an impact in the league with two sophomore girls, Mary Hillegas and Nicole Binald', earning first team honors. The boys' squad advanced to the regional meet. Boys Golf won the league led by senior Matt Shomo.

This past winter sports season marked the first season with Bowling as an official sport at Tallmadge. Senior bowler Ryan Gonzales bowled a perfect 300 game this season. Swimmers made a splash this season also. Sorry I couldn't avoid the pun. We had 8 swimmers advance to the district meet. Girls medley relay, boys 400 free relay and junior Brittany DiFiore made it in the 100 breaststroke. Our girls' basketball team had an impressive season going 15-5 and finishing third in the Suburban League which has not happened in over 20 years.

Our baseball team did very well this season. They emerged Suburban League and District Champs. Our softball team lost in the district championship game but had a strong season. Senior Joe Labosky was the district champion pole-vaulter and missed the state meet by 6 inches. The track team sent several other athletes to the regional meet in the long jump, pole vault, 4 by 800 m relay, 800 m run, 300 m hurdles and the 3200 m run.

Musically, Tallmadge High School flourished. Our marching band continued their hot streak by earning A1 also known as a superior rating at the state competition. If they are able to do it again next year they will set a Tallmadge High School record. Our A Capella choir earned a 1 at the state competition and ranked in the top six choirs in the state.

The school newspaper, "The Devils Tale", earned first place at the Ohio Scholastic Media Association banquet this spring as the top newsmagazine. The staff is led by teacher Julie Headrick and senior editor Patrick Riley. Other staff members received awards in areas such as editorials, opinion articles and layout and design.

Clubs made quite an impact this year, The RESPECT group grew great amounts adding over a dozen new members. Principal's Focus Group had lengthy talks on subjects such as the new school calendar. After Mrs. Kemp's retirement NHS was under the advising of Ms. Lisa Wilson. NHS raised money for the Leukemia Foundation and made for Christmas boxes for needy children. The club that made the greatest impact this past year was the Food Revolution group led by teacher Mike Srodawa. This group strives to make the school lunch healthier and add healthy options. This year a salad bar was introduced and after the winter break the menu changed. Everyday several options were available, healthy options of course.

Last Saturday the class of 2012 had their graduation ceremony. Valedictorian gave a touching, yet comical speech on our time at THS. We all will go our separate ways but will always be connected by one thing, Tallmadge High School.

I would like to thank the Tallmadge Alumni Association for letting me speak today. I would like to wish the class of 2013 the best of luck because they have some mighty fine shoes to fill. Thank you.
