134th ALUMNI DINNER JUNE 1, 2013

On June 1, 2013, 160 Alumni and guests met for the 134th Annual Alumni Dinner Meeting. The meeting began with a Social Hour in the gymnasium of Tallmadge Middle School at 5:30 PM with live music by the band, Coach. At 6:30 PM, the dinner, catered by Yummy's Bakery, was served. The menu included Tossed Garden Salad, Herb Crusted Pulled Pork, Boneless Baked Chicken with Hollandaise, Lasagna, Roasted Parmesan Potatoes, Vegetable Medley, Fresh Baked Rolls with Butter and Assorted Desserts.



The decorations were the traditional Blue and Gold.

A welcome was given by President Mary Rzewnicki Cushing (1974) which included the introduction of Superintendent Jeff Ferguson, the 2013 officers (1st Vice President, Bill Hilbish (1974); 2nd Vice President, Patty McNeal Hartshorn (1983); Secretary, Gayle Bross McMillan (1974); Treasurer, Mary Black Overholt (1963))

and members of the band, Coach, which included three Tallmadge Alumni: Dave Highsmith (1976), Jeff Bull (1976) and Gill Landwehr (1977). The invocation was given by Mark Hilbish (1973).

After dinner, those gathered moved to the Les Bennett Center for the Annual Meeting.

The meeting was called to order by Mary Cushing and the 2012 minutes were approved without additions or corrections.

There being no additions or corrections, the Treasurer's Report was approved as submitted.

Mary Cushing then welcomed Superintendent Jeff Ferguson. The Superintendent thanked the Alumni Association for continuing to support the Tallmadge schools through scholarships given to Tallmadge graduates. He assured the alumni attending that the core values that were in place when they attended Tallmadge schools were still in place today in the schools.

Recognition of 50-Year Class:

Mary Cushing then introduced the representative of the 50-year class, Ellen "Bobbie" Eddy:

In high school, Bobbie played all sports; the yearbook called her "most athletic". She was also in choir and was known for her role as "Momma" in *Bye Bye Birdie*. She was also sang in a trio with her sister Eileen and with JoAnn Houger. After school, she was a regional record salesperson. For our graduate, I'll translate (record = vinyl). She was still selling when 8-track tapes came in, but when cassettes came in, she called it quits and started a second career as a Licensed Hearing Instrument specialist. I call on Bobbie Eddy to speak to us for the Class of 1963.

Class of 1963 Report:

Good Evening and welcome to the 134th annual Tallmadge High School Alumni Association dinner and meeting. My name is Bobbie Eddy and I am here to represent the class of 1963.



I'd like to mention that our 50th class reunion is now being planned and will be held at the end of August. We graduated 139 students. Sadly only 119 remain as 20 fellow classmates are no longer with us. We think of them tonight.

Also tonight, as I look out I see a lot of familiar faces. Some faces are no longer so familiar. It makes me wonder if you are like me and think you feel younger than you look. Or maybe you think you look younger than you feel. Either way, it's all good because we're here!

In 1951 around the same time that Rosemary Clooney's "Come on-a My House" was #1 on the music charts we began first grade. With our new shoes on, we marched into the old elementary school on North Avenue. Some of us were excited, bold, and eager, while others were scared, tentative, and shy. All of us were curious. Our world was changing.

We were assailed by a new reality the consequences of which we would not fully appreciate for many years to come.

These were our formative years to be sure. As individuals we experienced those times each in his or her own way. Collectively, we gathered moments that became shared memories.

We came to study reading, writing and arithmetic but along the way we would also learn how to share with others and encourage one another. We would learn about opinions, rules, values, rights and responsibility. There were new people with whom to compare ourselves so while we learned to value others we also learned the need for authenticity, individuality, self-worth and self-expression.

We would experience diversity, and with that the value of tolerance and acceptance. We learned about choices and we learned about consequences.

I'd like to say a few words about music and songs. We were in school during the emergence of some of the most incredible music genres in history. Those genres set a standard that influenced all music since then. There is nothing that evokes memories and feelings like music. What songs do you think of? Where do those songs take you? Who were you hanging out with or how big was your hair when you were listening to songs like *Tequila*, *The Twist*, *Hand Jive*, *Duke of Earl*, or *He's So Fine* just to name a few.

Are you at a school dance, a band concert, drama club play? Maybe you have your first crush or were getting dumped for the first time!

You could be thinking of your favorite hang outs, places like under the bleachers, in the gym, in the locker room, the lab or the music room, our new schools, or maybe Lujan's.

By the way, aren't you glad you learned to drive on the Circle? Talk about preparation for real life! We not only learned how to drive but we learned where North, South, East and West were and everything in between – if you passed those tests. There will always be those who need a map to get to the end of the drive.

There are so many other things to mention: the games, the athletes, the cheers, the cheerleaders, the scholars and the scholarships, the meets, the debates, the wins and the losses, the Kings and the Queens, the awards and the awarded, the laughter and the tears.

There are people who were so important to our success not only in school but in life: our teachers, coaches, counselors, principals, superintendents, and the board of education. There are those who made our lives easier: the office staff, the bus drivers the maintenance staff and the cafeteria workers.

Through the 1950's we would witness many historical events. Television became the dominant mass media, Rosa Parks kept her seat on the bus in Alabama, Alaska and Hawaii became part of our United States, *I Love Lucy* was airing on TV, Dr. Seuss published *The Cat In The Hat*, and Elvis brought us Rock-n- Roll.

In September of 1959, we entered high school when *Sleep Walk* by Santo and Johnny was Billboard's #1.

And during the 1960's while we were in high school, the Berlin Wall was built, one of our presidents was John Kennedy, Martin Luther King marched on Washington, and the Beatles had their first US release with "I Want to Hold Your Hand".

In June of 1963 the most popular song was Leslie Gore's "It's My Party." Well, it was our party too and we didn't want to cry. At that point, after we had grown out of *many* pairs of shoes, one hundred and thirty nine of us said goodbye to the beginning and took our places in society at large. With that we also entered history as proud Tallmadge alumni.

Tonight we remember and celebrate all that was and all that came to be because of it. We are grateful for the *High Times* and the *Circle Light* because they help us remember all of these people, places, and things.

So whether we look younger and feel older or look older and feel younger, we can't help but think about how it all began and where we are in our lives today. Some of us feel we've accomplished our goals (and then some) while others still don't know what they want to be when they grow up. Regardless, there are still things to do, to look forward to and to contribute to. After all we didn't get all of this education for nothing.

I'd like to finish by saying to all of my classmates that this class would not have been what it was without the inclusion of each and every one of you. Always know that no matter who you were or what you did, you all counted, and above all else you mattered.

I am truly honored to have been your spokesperson. I was here tonight only because I was there with you then. Who Knew?

50-Year Pin Presentation/Recognition of Golden Agers

Gayle McMillan then presented the 50-year pins to members of the Class of 1963 and recognized all Golden Agers in attendance including Ruth Beers Sempell, Class of 1943, oldest alumni in attendance. Golden Agers are the 50-year class and older.

Recognition of the 25-Year Class:

Bill Hilbish introduced the 25-year class representative:

Class of 1988 Report:

Good evening everyone. I would like to take a moment to thank the Alumni Association for inviting me to represent the Class of '88. New Business:

The winners are all children or grandchildren of Tallmadge High School Alumni.

Mary Cushing reported on what the Alumni Officers did since the last annual meeting.

First, we set up a tent at the Tallmadge Circle Festival on August 20, 2012. It was our first time at the Festival and we didn't know what to expect. We had a phenomenal evening!

We wanted to get our name out there, let alumni know that the organization exists and has a website, get updates from alumni and sell some memberships and some goodwill. I think we accomplished every one of those goals, while having fun doing it.



We knew there were lots of people visiting our booth, but there was no way to really count them all. Based on the fact that many alumni had non-alumni spouses, kids and friends with them, we're guessing that we probably had 250-300 people stop by. Here are some details: We had 31 directory update forms and 7 new memberships. We had a drawing among the new members for a CD copy of the new directory. George Georgiou, Class of 1984, won. We took in \$52.50 for memberships, \$30.50 in donations for a total of \$83.00. We created a giant ALUMNI YEARBOOK and had 170 signatures in the yearbook that night.



We also gave out WEBSITE MAGNETS and PROUD TALLMADGE ALUMNI stickers. We're planning to be at the Festival again this August 17th. Stop by the tent and visit us!

Again this year was that we tapped into our online Alumni Directory and emailed our invitation to this dinner and annual meeting. Last year, we emailed the invitation to more than 4,000 alumni. This year, it went to 6,000 Alumni. Our goal reaching more alumni by email is to begin the process to let the alumni of Tallmadge High School know that this Alumni Association exists and that we hold these dinners and annual meetings. We hope that in future years this will pay off in increased attendance and more dues-paying members.

One last item of New Business: Next year's annual meeting will be held on Saturday, June 7, 2014.

A 50/50 raffle and door prize raffle was then held with prizes donated by local businesses.

Mary Cushing thanked the sponsors for their donations of gift certificates, Gayle Bross McMillan who donated the fairy garden and the flower arrangements on the tables and all attending for their support of the Alumni Association.

After the singing of the Alma Mater, the 134th Annual Meeting of the Tallmadge High School Alumni Association was adjourned.
